Discrimination complaint filed against Katy ISD

SEAT complaint concerns district's transgender policy

FROM STAFF REPORTS

Students Engaged in Advancing Texas (SEAT), a student-led movement demonstrating youth visibility in edu-

cational policymaking, filed a formal complaint of discrimination on November 13th with the U.S. Department of Education regarding a comprehensive anti-transgender policy passed by the Katy Independent School District's Board of Trustees in August, according to a press release posted on the organization's website.

The Katy Times reached out to Katy

ISD for commentary but, due to the holiday closure of the district offices, a response was not received by press

The complaint, delivered to the federal department's Office of Civil Rights, challenges the policy's adverse impact on transgender students, asserting violation of Title IX rights with Gender Identity discrimination and perpet-

uating harmful sex stereotypes and heteronormative gender roles.

In accordance with the policy, Katy ISD evidently outed at least 19 students to their parents, as reported by a Public Information Request by the independent news organization Houston Landing, said the press

Department urges Texans to find a sober ride during the holidays

AUSTIN - The holiday season is officially underway, with lots of office parties, neighborhood open houses and family dinners. For the friends and families of the 1,246 people killed last year in Texas by drunk drivers, the holidays this year (and for many years to come) will be a time of grief and sadness.

Starting Dec. 1, 2022, there were 108 people killed and 229 people seriously injured in just 32 days in DUI-alcohol related crashes across the state. All of these families suffered painful memories that will last a lifetime.

"Don't turn your holiday event into a life-changing tragedy by drinking and driving," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "A safe and sober ride should be at the top of



release. "This negligent enforcement raises serious concerns about privacy and emotional well-being of transgender students, who should be entitled to a safe and inclusive educational environment equal to that of cisgender peers," the press release continued.

"We used public knowledge as the basis of the complaint because students must be 18+ or obtain parental consent to submit the complaint form, and because of the sensitive nature of this policy, many transgender students without supportive families have had to remain silent," said SEAT Executive Director Cameron Samuels in an email to the Katy Times. "We do encourage and support students/parents statewide in filing their own complaints if they experience discrimination, and from our understanding, we are the first but not the only to file a complaint against Katy ISD's anti-transgender policy in some regard."

Samuels, a graduate of Seven Lakes High School, previously testified before the House Judiciary Committee on the Judiciary for a hearing of the Full Committee on "Book Bans: Examining How Censorship Limits Liberty and Literature" in Washington, D.C., on September 12th.

Katy ISD's policy, passed at the district's August 28 board meeting, prompted resounding community opposition with many individuals, including many students, expressing disapproval during more than four hours of impassioned public comments. Despite opposition, the board narrowly voted 4-3 shortly before midnight.

"I've seen firsthand how this policy has impacted transgender students, such as hostility and tension between students and educators," said Katy ISD sophomore and SEAT organizer Grace Ding. "Creating barriers for students to access support from trusted adults is a setback to progress made over decades."

'SEAT is no stranger to increasing hostility by Katy ISD toward LGBTQ+ students in recent years, including

unprecedented book bans and internet censorship," said the SEAT press release. Amid these challenges, the inaugural Katy Pride brought together over 2,000 attendees at FCC Katy in October, demonstrating the community's commitment to supporting all students, regardless of gender identity. Katy Pride, a nonprofit formed in June 2023, is committed to empowering the LGBTO+ community in Katy and West Houston by creating inclusive events, advocating for equality, and fostering a supportive community of acceptance and diversity.

Katy Pride President Amanda Rose issued the following statement:

"Katy Pride is founded on the belief that all humans should be valued and celebrated for their authentic selves. Living into our mission of advocacy, education and community, we stand in solidarity with students, parents and community members who experience discrimination as a result of policies that target LGBTQ+ people. Katy Pride continues to hear from students, educators and parents who are distressed by the anti-trans policy. We will continue to connect our Katy community members with resources and support to meet their needs. In the new year Katy Pride will continue to be present at school board meetings, host advocacy and education events such as voter registration and informational events and support Katy ISD LGBTQ+ student organizations. As an organization, our mission is to empower the LGBTQ+ community in Katy and West Houston by hosting inclusive events, advocating for equality, and fostering a supportive culture of acceptance and diversity.

In collaboration with Katy Pride and the ACLU of Texas, SEAT organized a Know Your Rights training for LGBTQ+ students and families in the district in November. The training empowered families with immediate understanding of the policy and direct resources, including SEAT's Student Resource Hub.

SEAT and the Katy community have

shown a steadfast commitment to supporting students across all backgrounds and identities, said the SEAT press release. Katy ISD junior Jarred Burton addressed the school board at a November meeting and published an op-ed on Friday in the Houston Chronicle to continue highlighting student experiences. Burton was also interviewed last week by ABC 13 news.

"This policy tries to endanger and erase trans students all under the misleading guise of parental authority and student safety, when it is clearly driven by ignorance and hate," said Burton. "Attempts at mental health awareness mean nothing with policies like this in place attempting to erase queer youth."

In its federal complaint, SEAT seeks a resolution that repeals Katy ISD's policy, provides direct resources to students impacted by the district's enforcement of that policy, establishes professional LGBTQ+ inclusion training for district personnel, and codifies nondiscrimination protections for gender identity.

We have not received an update yet from the regional Dallas branch of the Office, but we seek a mediation to completely repeal the policy, directly cover costs related to counseling or other support services for students impacted by the policy, establish LGBTQ+ inclusion training for district personnel, and adopt a nondiscrimination statement that protects LGBTQ+ students," said Samuels in the December 19th email to the Katy Times.

"Educators care deeply about their students. I have seen the amount of love they pour into their jobs and into their classes. Now, Katy ISD is forcing them to out their students and put children into potentially dangerous situations," said Katy ISD senior and SEAT organizer Pooja Kalwani. "By enforcing this discriminatory policy, Katy ISD will be intruding on students' free expression and privacy. Our lives are not something to manipulate with narrow beliefs, cis or

The campaign runs in support of a heightened law enforcement period from Dec. 16 through Jan. 1, when more officers are on the road looking for drunk drivers.

Betty Ann Chandler Cardiff, a beloved mother, grandmother, great grandmother, and friend, passed away peacefully in her home in Katy on December 15, 2023. She was 98 years of age.

Betty was born on July 23, 1925, in Enid, Oklahoma to Shirley and James Chandler. The family moved to various towns in Oklahoma and Texas following her father's career at Shell Oil Co. In 1933, the family settled in Brookshire, Texas, where Betty attended Brookshire Primary School. In 1942, she graduated from Katy High School at the age of sixteen as salutatorian of a class of sixteen. She attended Sam Houston State Teachers College for two years. Betty returned to Brookshire and joined Humble Oil Co. (Exxon) at the Katy Gas plant where she worked as a secretary for three years.

In late August her home would be transformed for fall and adorned with turkey plates and pumpkins. Decorating for Christmas is where her talent shined brightest. It made the holiday truly special. Amazingly, she continued this seasonal endeavor until the age of 94! Other loves of Betty's were traveling and antiquing. She was an original Round Top shopper from its inception in 1968 at the Rifle Hall until just a couple of years ago, and her worldly travels allowed her the opportunity to make some great finds. Betty lived a full life of joy, laughter, and love.

She was preceded in death by her loving husband John William Cardiff, son Wayne Chandler Cardiff and parents Shirley and James Chandler. It was a tight game though that took the Cougars into the second half to pull away behind a strong defense and an offensive outburst from Foy.

yardage, we stayed behind the chains and that can't happen against a very good defense."

But Dameon Pearce got Houston back into it with a much needed 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. They followed that up with another touchdown on a pass from Flacco to David Njoku. Cleveland had a chance to add to the lead shortly before halftime, but Derek Stingley came away with an interception in the endzone to keep the deficit at 22-7.

"There were self-inflicted wounds in critical moments and the game just got away from us," said quarterback Case Keenum. "They have one of the best defenses in the NFL and then on offense they had Joe (Flacco) and their receivers playing great and it was tough keeping up. You go through tough games in this league but it's about getting back up and getting back out there. We still have a chance and an

opportunity, so we have to get back up — there's still a couple games to go and we'll see how this thing shakes out."

The second half was more of the same for Houston. Joe Flacco threw another touchdown to Cooper from 7 yards out late in the third quarter and Kareem Hunt ran in a 1-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter while Houston's offense never came close to getting them back in it, with Davis Mills throwing two garbage time touchdowns to trim the deficit before things ended.

The loss dropped the Texans to

8-7. Houston will be at home again next week when they play the Titans in their home finale. It will be another huge game as Houston tries to keep their playoff hopes alive.

'The main thing is we have to play better football," Ryans said.
