Typically, state constitutional amendments requiring voter approval are on he November general election ballot. But a Bettencourt staff member said last
week that extended legistative special week that extended legislative special sessions kept the propositions from re-
ceiving the needed aproval in ceiving tene needed approval in time for
placement on the November ballot. As a result, they are on the next ballot, which is May 7 . In a statement describing the prop-
ositions, Bettencourt said many voters ositions, Bettencourt said many voters
have found the ballot language to be confusing.
"I want to clarify what these amendments actually do," Bettencourt said. "Homeowners over the age of 65 will
see their freeze values for school taxes actually decline, a.k.a., ISD property tax bills if Proposition 1 passes. Also, if passed, Proposition 2 will lower independent school district property tax bills by increasing the homestead exemption

hearing on the project. Comments are still being sought, and can be provided by phone, comment card, email, or regular mail.
The project runs for about 10
miles miles from I-10 to FM 1463 , with
an existing right-of-way 100 feet an existing right-of-way 100 feet
wide. The road now has one lane in each direction, with eight-foot-wide shoulders and an open and closed drainage system. Department officials have said US 90 must be expanded to improve mobility, particularly as the Katy rapid growth. Officials have also said that crash rates on this segment of
US 90 are higher than the average US 90 are higher than the average
crash rates on similar roadways. The higher crash rates result in potentially
