Katy ISD annually reviews its
attendance boundaries to ensure attendance boundaries to ensure
the district is adequately addressing its fast growth, as well as student and staff capacity at schools. The district surveyed the families
who were identified as potentially impacted by the boundary modifications. Currently, the northwest quad rant of Katy ISD is experiencing
increased growth due to new housing developments and
businesses coming to the area.
Both Junior High \#18 and High School \#10 are located in this quadrant and are scheduled to open in the fall of 2024. To view the final ABM modifications, visit the Katy ISD ABM Christopher J. Smith, Chief Financial Officer at Katy ISD announced that the district has for "Superior Achievement" in the

## KAEDC celebrates groundbreaking for new medical office building

The Scott Square Medical Office Building project will be a three-story, tilt wall structure with over 25,000

older buildings, convert the fellowship hall into a chapel, and expand the office area to include a new pastor's office. But space continued to be a problem and five portabl buildings were purchased in 1981. In 1985 a Long Range Planning Commit-
tee was reactivated and it struggled with the concept of relocation. In 1986 the committee presented a motion to find land for the church, which was overwhelmingly adopted The church found 20 acres on Pin Oak Road at Roberts Street, which was purchased in
1993 for $\$ 450,000.00$ and dedicated in 1994 . one campus relocation was approved in 1997. In 1998, the church celebrated its 100th birthday. The new vision statement said, in part: "We will be intentionally involved in
