School board hears proposed changes to cell phone policy

Superintendent's evaluation and contract also unanimously approved

A draft of an updated policy on students' use of cell phones on campus was presented to the Katy ISD school board at Monday night's meeting at the Education Support Complex, 6301 S. Stadium Lane in Katy. The draft of the new policy - which is still in development - would ban students' use of their personal devices such as cell phones during the classroom instructional periods. The proposed change does not change policy at elementary campuses, which already have a "no cell phone use" policy in place, but does affect secondary campuses, which have been operating under a "bring your own device" policy for the last several years, according to district officials. However, with the roll-out of the district's new "1:1 Chromebook' initiative in the 2024-2025 school year, students will no longer need access to their own devices during

classroom time, officials said. According to the policy draft, students must turn off and put away their cell phones during each classroom period. Cell phone usage may be permitted outside the classroom in accordance with current campus guidelines, which may vary from school to school. The draft continues the current policy which forbids cell phone use of any kind in restrooms or locker rooms at all times. There is no change to the policy regarding cell phone use in an emergency situation - students and staff may continue to follow required safety guidelines and protocols, officials said.

There is no change to the "personal responsibility $\tilde{"}$ aspect of cell phone use on campus; students are still responsible for their phones and the district does not assume responsibility for lost or stolen

The "in class" policy change will be reinforced on campus through the use of "cell phone guidelines" posters which explain the new rules and the consequences.

Infractions will be subject to the campuses' Discipline Management Plan, which assigns consequences based on criteria developed for each campus. Several trustees, including Mary Ellen Cuzela and Morgan Calhoun, expressed concern that the standards for infractions were not uniform across the



district, while trustee Rebecca Fox supported campus autonomy. Board president Victor Perez asked that the board's policy committee meet with district officials in order to give additional feedback about the proposed plan.

The policy draft was developed after benchmarking with neighboring districts who already have a 1:1 device policy, through feedback from KISD principals and from the Spring Discipline Management meetings. The policy has been in place at Morton Ranch Junior High for several months and district officials said that the school has seen a rise in test scores following its imple-

The policy is needed in order to eliminate distractions in the classroom, officials said.

District officials plan to present a final draft of the policy to the board in June for approval, so that it can be reviewed prior to inclusion in the updated student handbook for the coming year. The new policy, once approved, will be posted in July ahead of students' return to campus in August, so that parents can fill out all the necessary "return to school" forms which will include an acknowledgement of this policy

The board also went into closed session for two separate consultations with the district's attorney. In the first session, the evaluation and present contract status for current superintendent Ken Gregorski was approved by all seven board members, but no details were shared following trustees' return to the open meeting.

Trustees went into closed session a second time to consider several terminations and non-renewals of other employee contracts and followed in open session by approving several recommended terminations.

Thirteen public speakers spoke during the "public comments" portion of the meeting, with most in support of the current board. Several speakers, including Dr. Rob Lyerly, senior pastor at Katy's First Baptist Church, spoke

said presenter Christpher Laack of VLK Architects. "It will look at our future while reflecting on our past."

Associate Vice President and Creative Director Chris Frison of DG Studios, which won the bid to redesign the center, further described the forthcoming changes. The updated center will have a kids' zone depicting the area's industries of rice farming, oil and gas and the railroad. A 136" interactive touch screen will enable residents and visitors to drill down and zoom in on information on how to live, work and play in Katy. The screen will also feature a map, along with information about upcoming events and area schools. Two virtual characters who have lived in Katy all their lives - one a student and one a retired person - will also interact with visitors. Themed racks for informational brochures will be installed along the walls; these can easily be changed out and updated, Frison said. A large history wall will feature a QR code which can be scanned for additional information on area landmarks.

The project was originally bid at \$1.2 million but Laack said that it was now projected to come in at \$952,370.53. Once contracts are in place, the renovations will take between four and five months, he said, depending on the availability of materials and barring any unforeseen circumstances.

Following the presentation, council went into closed session to consult with an attorney regarding the purchase, exchange or lease of properties near Pitts and Morton Road, according to the agenda. No announcements or discussion took place following council's return to the open meeting.

Public hearings on zoning issues dominated the middle portion of the

- A special use permit was granted to the Apostolic Church LAWANA of Katy, allowing them to operate at 5038 East Fifth Street in an area which is zoned C-1 commercial. Two area residents spoke against the measure, citing insufficient parking and safety concerns that included a lack of crosswalk, no signal light and heavy traffic along Fifth Street. The church has 90 days to comply with the permitting process, which includes obtaining an occupancy permit.
- A special use permit was denied to On Time Halo Angel Kidz Residen-

tial Treatment Facility, which was seeking approval to operate a residential treatment facility for emotionally disturbed children. The property at 6002 Franz Court is located in a historic residential area; nine public speakers weighed in on the issue. Six of those speakers including former city councilmember Ray Booth, who lives in the area, opposed the zoning change with most expressing fears about the home's potential threats to safety in the neighborhood. Increased traffic and parking were also mentioned as objections to the facility.

In other action, council:

- Moved forward with the 10th Street Bridge replacement project, awarding a \$2,885,803.00 bid to John Reed and Company LLC of Houston and approving a \$99,250.00 proposal for ARKK Engineers LLC to manage the project. The current bridge will be demolished and during the reconstruction process, traffic will be re-routed along clearly marked detours. The project is slated to begin in July 2024 and to be completed in February 2025, said David Kaspar of
- Approved the use of \$52,801 in METRO funds for the acquisition of additional right-of-way for the Katy Hockley Road widening project.
- Approved the use of \$96,369 in METRO funds for the acquisition of additional right-of-way for the Katy Hockley Cut-Off Road reconstruction project.

A local veterans' organization wants to ensure that veterans buried in a Katy cemetery

Each year since 2018, the American Legion Post 164 of Katy has held the Wreaths Across America Ceremony at Magnolia Cemetery.

"Since that first year we have discovered over two dozen veterans without a headstone to place their wreath upon," said Ernie Cormier, past commander of the post. "This year Legion Post 164, with support from the Katy Elks Lodge 2628 and the US Sea Cadet of the Houston Chapter, has started a new program called 'Headstones For Heroes.'

"At this time, we are trying to reach out and find the families and/or friends so to help us gather information about them so that we may get their headstone through the Veterans Administration. Teachers at Morton Ranch High School are reaching out to the community to help raise funds to send four students to the national competition of the Future Business Leaders of America in Orlando, Florida, June 28th - July 2nd.

"On April 12, these four amazing FBLA students placed in the top 4 at FBLA State and qualified to go to FBLA Nationals," said the group's advisor, Karla Foit, in an April post on Facebook. "There are over 7000 students at FBLA State from all over the state of Texas competing there and competition is fierce!! Only the top four of each of the 77 competition categories will advance to Nationals."

The competitions the students placed in are as follows:

- Journalism, placing second (test-
- based competition) • Intro to Event Planning, collaborative team, placing third (test and presentation competition)
- Future Business Leader, placing fourth (test, project and presentation the student had to first create a resume and cover letter, then place high on a test to get to the finals, where they then have an interview with a judge)

"Unfortunately, Katy ISD does not help pay for Nationals for the students or teacher advisors, so we have to fundraise for the entire trip," said Foit in the Facebook post.

Individuals interested in helping fund the trip may contribute to a gofundme account at MRHSFLBA24. GROUPFUND.US.

In 2022-2023 school year, Morton Ranch hired three new business teachers, including Foit, Jessica McAndrews and Christopher Fausto, and Foit was asked to take over Future Business

Leaders of America, FBLA, in addition to teaching business. There were just five FBLA student members. Foit and McAndrews made it their mission to not only grow FBLA but to grow the business department overall. They grew from five FBLA members, to 56 FBLA members in the 2022-2023 school year. They had 29 students competing at FBLA state, up from just two FBLA students the year before. Three students placed in the top four, qualifying for the 2023 FBLA National competition in Atlanta, Georgia. This marked the first time in over 10 years that any student from Morton Ranch had qualified to go to FBLA Nationals. Only two were able to attend. To save on costs, Foit paired up with the FBLA advisor from Paetow and the duo drove their three students

to the competition in Atlanta. In 2023-2024, Foit, McAndrews and Fausto had so many kids excited about business that Morton Ranch had to hire a fourth teacher to join the business department. They also were able to increase the number of FBLA student members from 56 to 101. This year, there were 46 students competing at FBLA state and four students placed in the top four to qualify for the 2024 national competition in Orlando, Florida, along with two alternates that placed fifth. At this time, to save costs to get these kids to Nationals, Foit and McAndrews will be driving them there.

"We are so proud of these kids and excited to see the business program at Morton Ranch continuing to grow," said Foit in an email to the Katy Times. "In 2024-2025, Morton Ranch will have a fifth business teacher due to so many students signing up and getting excited about taking business classes. We hope to continue to grow the FBLA program and have more kids going to Nationals in 2025 to Anaheim, California."






Katy, Taylor win, forcing three-way tie for first in district

Katy and Taylor both won on Friday to move into a tie for first place in district with Cinco Ranch, while Tompkins outlasted Jordan to stay in fourth place and Morton Ranch earned its second district win of the

Udland leads Katy past Seven Lakes

Connor Udland led Katy to an important win on Friday, as the Tigers beat Seven Lakes 3-1 behind a strong performance on the mound from the junior, improving to 18-10 on the season and 11-3 in district play to go into a tie for first in district. Udland pitched six of seven innings and allowed just one hit and one run while

striking out eight and walking three. Katy got on the board first in the game, scoring in the top of the second when Ashten Ballew hit a single that drove in a run, the Tigers added a second when Aiden Barrientes grounded into a fielders choice that brought home a run in the fifth inning in the sixth off an error. Seven Lakes got one run back in the bottom of the sixth on a balk by Udland, but Katy held on the rest of the way as Arvey Huerta pitched a clean seventh, striking out two and not allowing

Jace Garcia got Seven Lakes' lone hit and run. James Levin pitched 3.2 innings and had three hits while striking out three and walking three, allowing just one run. Seven Lakes dropped to 16-11-2 overall and 8-6 in district, staying in fifth place and two games behind Tompkins for the last playoff spot.

Taylor outlasts Paetow to move into tie for first

A Taylor win moved the Mustangs into that same three-way tie for first with Katy and Cinco, as the Mustangs came out on top in a 13-10 win over Paetow to improve to 21-10-1 overall and 11-3 in district.

Carlos Cardozo led the way for Taylor with three RBIs, while Chase Marshall added two RBIs on three hits and Zach Larsen had two RBIs as well. Christian Jaquay

earned the win on the mound, pitching the final three innings for Taylor and allowing one earned run on three hits while striking out five and walking two.

Paetow got on the board in the second inning when Hector Millan hit a solo home run. Adniel Quiles-Torres added another on a single and Victor Salazar made it 4-0 by driving in two more on a single. Maddox Prentice added to the Panthers' lead in the third with a solo home run and Manny Montalvo drove in two more to make it 7-0 Paetow.

Taylor started to come back in the bottom of the third. Peter Dworaczyk got a run across on a bases loaded walk and Cardozo got another across on a single. A hit by pitch got a third run across for Taylor before David Harris hit a single for a fourth Taylor run. Davidenko Rodriguez drove in another on a single before a passed ball that allowed a run trimmed Paetow's lead to 7-6. Millan increased Paetow's lead to 8-6 in the top of the fourth with an RBI single, but Taylor answered back with a Cardozo RBI single to trim the deficit back to one, but Paetow went back up by two with a run off an error in the top of the fift Taylor kept fighting though and got a run off a bases loaded walk before tying it in the bottom of the fifth on a bases loaded hit by pitch, taking the lead on a catcher's interference later in the inning.

Taylor added on in the sixth, as Chase Marshall drove in two on a single before Taylor made it a four-run lead off an error. Paetow got one run back in the top of the seventh on a Prentice single, but weren't able to muster any more and fell by three






she was three and was competing by the time she was eight years old. Over time, she fell in love with all of the aspects of skating, from the competition to the flair to the ways to express yourself on the ice — it was something that Rodriguez

It was a big day last week at the District 19-6A track meet, as the Tompkins boys clinched their fourth straight district title and the Katy girls clinched the team's second straight district title.

On the boys side, Tompkins had a big day in a number of events, Jhase McMillan won the district title in the 200-meter dash with a time of 21.30 seconds, while Griffen Saacke won the 3200-meter run with a time of nine minutes, 12.01 seconds. Jayden Keys won the 110-meter hurdles with a time of 13.44 seconds while coming in second in the 300-meter hurdles with a time of 37.26 seconds, also winning the long jump with a jump, while Etoro Bassey won the high jump. Tompkins also won the 400-meter relay with a time of 40.35 seconds and the 800-meter relay with a time of one minute, 24.22 seconds.

While that was the highlight of this year, it's been one that is building from the talent and coaching all around the district. Over the last three years, Katy ISD has sent five teams to the state tournament — the Jordan boys in 2022, the Seven Lakes boys in 2022, 2023 and 2024 and the Seven Lakes girls in 2024. Last year all four boys teams advanced to the third round of the playoffs, where there was an All Katy ISD regional quarterfinal and this year the boys advanced three teams to the third round while the girls advanced two teams, with two teams on both sides advancing to the regional final.

"I think this is going to be a common thing because the sport is still growing in our district and as the competition increases, it's only going to make every team and player in our district better and prepare them for every playoff season," Krueger said. "It's a testament to what we have in Katy ISD and it's not surprising to me that we had the four teams left standing in the district. It's a special place to be."

It wasn't an easy road for those teams either. The Jordan girls knocked off one of the top ranked team in the region, Stratford, in the third round before defeating Brazoswood in the regional semifinals and taking Seven Lakes to extra time in the regional final. The Seven Lakes girls beat a Memorial team that took down Ridge Point and beat both Pearland and Jordan, only giving up one goal through their playoff run before falling to Prosper in the state semifinals. On the boys side, Seven Lakes powered through the playoffs to win their second straight state tournament, the first ever for a Class 6A boys program. Cinco Ranch made it all the way to the regional final, only giving up two goals while scoring 13 goals in their first four playoff games and Jordan made it to the third round by upsetting District 20-6A Champion Ridge Point in the first round before beating Cy-Ridge in the second round. Jordan also gave Seven Lakes its hardest game of the entire playoffs, forcing the Spartans to a penalty shootout.

penalty shootout.

"This district has such a high level," said Cinco Ranch head coach Ryan Searle. "We have players who are trialing in Europe all over the place and we have others that raise their level to compete even with those top guys. The talent across the board is ridiculous. You can see it through all levels — it's

great and I don't think it's going anywhere."




